## **Exercise: They vs Them**

Instructions: In this exercise, choose between the words "Them" and "They" to fill in the blank in each sentence.

1.	Sarah and Tom are going to the movies. I'll meet there later.
2.	I saw Lisa and Jake at the party, but I didn't get a chance to talk to
3.	The team celebrated when won the championship.
4.	The students were excited when the teacher told about the surprise field trip
5.	I lent my books to Mary and John. Did you get a chance to return to me?
6.	The children were playing outside, and I joined for a game of soccer.
7.	The team members were excited because had qualified for the finals.

## Answers with explanation: They or Them

- 1. Sarah and Tom are going to the movies. I'll meet them there later. Explanation: Use "them" because it refers to Sarah and Tom, who are the objects of the action (going to the movies). In this case, "them" is the object pronoun.
- 2. I saw Lisa and Jake at the party, but I didn't get a chance to talk to them. Explanation: Similar to the first sentence, "them" is used as the object pronoun because Lisa and Jake are the objects of the action (talk to).
- 3. The team celebrated when they won the championship.

  Explanation: Use "they" because it refers to the team as the subject of the action (won the championship). In this case, "they" is the subject pronoun.
- 4. The students were excited when the teacher told them about the surprise field trip. Explanation: Again, "them" is used as the object pronoun because it refers to the students, who are the objects of the action (told about the surprise field trip).
- 5. I lent my books to Mary and John. Did you get a chance to return them to me? Explanation: Use "them" because it refers to the books, which are the objects of the action (return). In this case, "them" is the object pronoun.
- 6. The children were playing outside, and I joined them for a game of soccer. Explanation: "Them" is used as the object pronoun, referring to the children, who are the objects of the action (joined for a game of soccer).
- 7. The team members were excited because they had qualified for the finals. Explanation: Use "they" because it refers to the team members as the subject of the action (had qualified for the finals). In this case, "they" is the subject pronoun.
